FIVE FLAWS I'VE SEE IN HANDLING CHURCH CONFLICT

In some cases light conflict can be a sign of vitality. The church is growing and working through challenges with people, parking and building space.

However, the majority find church conflict to be a real burden and a serious distraction to the Lord's work.

1. I'LL JUST IGNORE AND IT WILL GO AWAY

If it's a minor bump that may be true. Failure to set boundaries may only embolden a person to continue their bad behavior. I've heard over and over, "you know so and so, that's just the way they are." Excusing bad behavior in church never works in the long run.

2. THIS IS JUST A STAND ALONE INCIDENT

To see certain conflicts as totally unrelated to anything else in the church might be unwise. There's normally a pattern to conflicts and they don't occur in a vacuum. For example a church might make a change in the worship service and that creates upheaval in the Children or Youth area.

3. I CAN HANDLE THIS BY MYSELF

Sometimes the Lord blesses and you can resolve it alone. If you're the pastor, you have staff members or lay people who love you

and support the decisions you make. Lean on them to help you handle the problematic issues that arise in ministry. They should be ready to support you.

4. IF I SET LIMITS OR BOUNDARIES ON PEOPLE IT WILL BE VIEWED AS MEAN OR UNKIND

Resolving conflicts at some point in time will bring all of us to this moment. In reality, it is kinder to set limits with those who can't set them for themselves. There are times when a church leader has to say, "You can't act like that here," or "We're not going to speak to one another like that at church." This can be a real expression of love.

5. I'LL JUST ACCOMMODATE THE DIFFICULT PERSON AND THAT WILL SOLVE IT

We might feel better when we do it, but yielding ground or giving them things they want in church will not solve it. I've not seen that work with four year olds or adults.

Here are two great quotes I found from Rev. M. R. Marcuson concerning conflict.

A strong, effective and compassionate shepherd functions as the IMMUNE SYSTEM for the congregation.

Shepherds are to protect the wider church community from the least mature, for the sake of the whole and for the sake of the future.




Another great MAY-HIM was experienced by 288 participants at our 37th Annual Senior Adult Choir Festival at Camp Bethany.

Keep us in your prayers as we keep working hard for Jesus!





THE BRUTAL **FACTS**

We often read statistics that paint a negative picture of where the church has landed in the 21st century. With that in mind I want to point out something that I think is positive and can be a great opportunity for us all today. According to statisticians, 60% of lost people in Louisiana will not respond to an invitation to attend a church

event, function or service. Yet, 70 % of the 60% are interested in having a conversation about God and even interested in knowing more about the Bible! In round numbers, that is approximately 1.1 million people living in our state. Let's consider the opportunities before us.

Where are these folks? They are in our neighborhoods, sitting with us at ball practice, coaching our kids and working next to us. How do we know if they are interested in talking? Well, we must start a Gospel conversation. Sadly, we have been fooled into thinking that going out in our culture with the Gospel doesn't work anymore.

What would I say? Simply start with your story or testimony. Nobody has one just like yours and people are interested in personal stories. Then take a moment to share a simple Gospel tool. The one I have been using lately is 3 Circles: Life Conversation Guide. It is amazing to watch the Holy Spirit speak as you draw some pictures on a napkin or piece of paper.

What do I do if they say yes to Jesus? Start doing life with them and model what a disciple of Christ does. Again, statistics show that what a new believer learns in the first three months will be what they reproduce.

What if? What if we started a Gospel conversation this week? It could be the difference in eternity for some one you know!
