KEEPING OUR YOUNG

"How do we keep young people in church," is a question I've heard my entire ministry. LifeWay Research has done extensive study on this subject. They interviewed hundreds of young adults who had attended church prior to age 18 or attended church as an 18-22 year old.

The church characteristics that dominated their findings on why young people dropped out of church are listed below. I'll combine the first three because they're basically symptoms of the same issue.

1. INSINCERE, HYPOCRITICAL, & INAUTHENTIC

37% of young adults who dropped out of church said that when they attended church as a teen or college student, they saw church members who were insincere. Fakes. Phonies. The church members weren't genuine or honest. For those who continued to stay in church, 69% said the church they attended as a teenager had authentic leadership and members.

It should be obvious how much importance the next generation places on the general idea of being honest about your beliefs and working to live up to those standards. Young people clearly want a church that is not pretending to be something it is not, while actually striving to faithfully follow their biblical convictions. They aren't looking for perfection, but they do want honesty. I'll combine the next three findings as well.

2. SUPPORTIVE, NON-JUDGMENTAL & FORGIVING

The age old challenge for those who minister to young people has been, "How do you love and encourage young people whose life decisions run counter to scripture, without running them off?" We know the Bible states that man is fallen in nature, and when we sin we need forgiveness. Young people want to know that when they sin God can forgive them, and equally that people in the church can forgive them too.

49% of those who dropped out as a teenager, said that their church was very judgmental of their life choices. The definition of "judgmental" was never given in the research, but we know that reading God's standard from scripture is enough to expose anyone's sin. Our nature is to avoid accountability, whether it's from God or the person on the other end of the pew. Removing yourself from church is always an easy solution.

3. INSPIRATIONAL, CARING & WELCOMING round out the last three characteristics young adults wished their church would have been when they were teens and college age students.

By becoming a more Christlike congregation, churches will inevitably be more inviting to the next generation. Blessings, Lane


Joan were present as the Board voted for me to become the next Director.


back on that advice until I realized that to be a minster is Fellowship Baptist Church, PERSONAL. There are times that people


